From the President

Juniors brought the regatta season to a triumphant close with a run of great performances at the Trickett regatta following an excellent ACT Championships. And not only the juniors – David Gruen did well to get into his singles final at Triickett! Mark has provided a detailed account of the regatta, but it was good that CLRC was so strongly represented at the NSW championships, with great enthusiasm. Many thanks to coaches Mark, Rod, John C, and Elli for their work, to Catherine & Anita for their organization, and to the parents for their contributions to making it happen.

Masters also had a good end of season event, taking the Yolles down to Bairnsdale in Gippsland, with a 50k row down the Mitchell River, across King Lake to Paynesville, then and back on the first day. On the next day, rowing up the river, past platypuses diving, as far as it seemed navigable. We greatly appreciated the support of Bairnsdale Rowing Club. They are holding a regatta, Head of the Mitchell River, on 29-30 August - an event we could think about taking part in. It is a magnificent rowing river.

The club welcomes several new masters members - graduates of John C's latest learn-to-row course, a couple of new arrivals in Canberra – Nigel, David, and Geoff – and a welcome returnee, Fergus.

Para-rowing has been going well – thanks to all those who are helping Charlie and Roland. The club has always been open to para-rowing and has, at times, had competitive teams, but we have never had such an integrated and dedicated program. I am trying to run a roster of people able to assist on a once-a-month basis, whether coaching or rowing in a boat with para-rowers. Anyone I haven't already harassed who'd like to help, please let me know.

News on the club-house is, unfortunately, no news. The plans went before the National Capital Authority on 24 February, and there have been some subsequent discussions between it and the LDA, however there is no decision as yet.

With winter rowing approaching, we need to be particularly careful about safety,

- making sure that boats are lit
- not venturing out in thick fog
- not heading off in a single without others around you
- being particularly careful with direction and keeping to the right side of the lake around the museum, Yarralumla Bay, and heading back to the club in East Basin.

Edward Trickett Regatta Report

It was a keen group of over 40 rowers, accompanied by parents, children, coaches, and hangerson, towing two trailers carrying 29 boats and several dozen oars; along with a mountain of confidence in their ability to put Capital Lakes on the NSW rowing map, that set off from Canberra one Friday recently.

Their confidence was well placed. The Sydney International Rowing Centre was the venue for some excellent rowing from Masters and Juniors representing the Club at the NSW Grade Championships "Edward Trickett" regatta on the weekend of 11-12 April 2015.

Competition was fierce and consistent, with CLRC rowers in the first event of the Regatta, right through to the last events on the week-end. There was a particularly crazy time on Sunday morning with coaches, rowers, and parents getting 22 crews, their boats, and their oars in the right place at the right time – all in a 90 minute period. It all worked in the end, but only through the usual good humour of all, and co-operation from everyone.

Excellent results were achieved by many crews, with most bettering their previous personal bests, and many crews making semi-finals and finals. These were huge improvements over the results crews achieved at the same regatta last year. Highlights included:

- Mika Leslie, Bec Hyslop, Jess Gruen and Tiff McCormack making the final of the Women's C Grade quad. Tough event, and they acquitted themselves very well.
- David Gruen making the final of the Men's Novice Single scull, and recording a respectable time for a bloke rowing against much younger competitors.
- Alex Grzeskowiak getting a very fast second, and silver medal, in the Final of the Men's D
 Grade single scull. Beaten by just a canvas, this was amazing for a bloke still in his first year
 of rowing.
- Abbie Ryan and Ashleigh Scrivener rowing some tough heats and semis, with excellent times, to make it to the final of the Women's C Grade double. These two very good rowers will be the ones to watch next season.
- Mikaela Dingley, a silver in the Final of the Para single scull. This is Mikaela's second outing at *Trickett* and she gets better with each row. One to watch.
- Tiffany and Beck getting through to the final of the Women's coxless pair. The two of them
 have only had about a dozen rows in this difficult to handle sweep boat, but keep coming
 back for more.

- Geordie Carscadden and Henry Bowyer in the Final of the Men's C Grade single. Both had over 80% of the "gold time", with Henry dominating for the Gold Medal in the Final.
- Lucy Egan-Richards & Emma Gruen making the final of the Women's Novice double scull.
 Emma started at CLRC as a cox, and Lucy has only been rowing since September last year.
 They cracked sub 4mins 30 sec in the final and these two Under 15's look the goods into the future.
- In the same race as Lucy and Emma G, the excellent row for second in the Women's Novice
 double scull by Isabella Hancock and Mercedes Bowers. These two relative new comers to
 the sport achieved excellent times in their heat and in the final. Winning the Silver, they
 missed Gold by just half a length. A very impressive row.
- Eliza Burton & Emma Stanton; Deanna Carscadden & Pip Gazard; along with Lily Bryant & Sophia Rimes all making the Semis and two of those crews then moving onto the Final of the Women's D Grade double scull. Lily and Sophia were unlucky to draw the fastest semi. In an exciting final with only 10 seconds covering first to fifth, Eliza & Emma won Gold, with Deanna & Pip being just out of the medals with a very fast fourth.
- The boys, **Henry, Geordie, Byron** & **Alex,** rowing a tough Men's B Grade quad and reaching the final, to be beaten by much older and more experienced crews.
- The boys again, Henry, Geordie, Byron & Alex, making it to the Final of the Men's C Grade quad. The final was a beauty, with any of the eight crews capable of winning. At the end of this very exciting race, just three seconds covered first to fifth, with judges requiring photos to decide three placings. The boys were deservedly awarded the Silver after a very tough, very strong row.
- Backing up after the double the previous day, Emma G & Lucy made the final of the Women's Novice single scull. Both rowed very well in that final, with Emma rowing sub-5 mins in both the heat and the Final.
- In the Women's D Grade single scull, a raft of CLRC rowers made the semis, including Ella Kidd, Emma S, Eliza, Deanna, and Pip. However, due to conflicts with other races, several of these rowers had to scratch from the semis. Ella went on to row through, and only missed the final by a second. Ella gets better with every row and has improved heaps towards the end of the season.
- In the Men's C Grade double scull, the boys had split into doubles of Henry & Alex; and Byron & Geordie. Both doubles made the final, with good rows against quality opponents.
- The Women's D Grade quad scull show-cased the depth, and up-and-coming numbers in the Club, with six CLRC crews entered. Girls in these ranged from Year 7s to Year 12s and a Masters rower. The Club does not have six coxless quads, so one of the crews raced in a coxed boat (without a cox'n), but still in a much larger and heavier boat than their competitors. All of these crews rowed outstanding races with some very creditable times being recorded in the heats and the semi's all of which were very fast races. Two crews made it to the Semi's and then onto the Final. In the final, the crews of Isabella Hancock, Mercedes Bowers, Billie Miles & Abbie Ryan; along with Deanna, Eliza, Emma S & Pip both rowed sub-4 minutes, with Deanna, Eliza, Emma S & Pip winning Gold over two very good Sydney-based club crews.
- Five CLRC rowers were in the Women's C Grade single scull, with **Beck** and **Jess** making it to the semi's. These two always rise to the occasion at *Trickett*, and had very good rows in their heats and in their semi's.
- But the big heart award for this year is shared by Lily Bryant & Lucy Egan-Richards. Due to scheduling imperatives, Lily rowed a B Grade single scull (2,000 metres), followed by a C Grade single scull (1,000 metres) 30 minutes later. Lucy rowed three Novice / D Grade races in a 60 minute period. Neither complained, nor asked to be scratched from these events. Well done ladies.

But at the end of the day it was rowing, and CLRC, that was the winner. All CLRC rowers bettered their PBs, had a great time and learnt more about themselves and their crew mates than they would in a month of training on LBG. When the final boat was wearily unloaded on Sunday evening, and the last tinnie polished and put away on Monday morning after the regatta, those 40 rowers had every reason to be very pleased with themselves and their efforts – not just at *Trickett*, but all year.

Special thanks goes to all of the **parents** who yet again brought their rowers up to Sydney and fed, watered and supported them all week-end. There is no way that coaches could do their job without your unstinting support and good humour. Very special thanks to **Steve** and **Kathy Grzeskowiak**, and to **John Carpenter** for towing the two trailers to and from Sydney and to **John Harris** for loaning his ute for the week-end. And again to Kathy for organising much of the accommodation. Huge thanks to **Catherine Bowyer** and **Anita Carscadden** for all the often unseen work that they do to prepare for the regatta, get us there, keep us going while we are

there and provide the reality check when we get stressed. We definitely could not do it all without either of you. Thanks heaps.


