KANGAS Softball Club have gotten proactive in addressing the club's current shortage of junior players, travelling to local Barossa Valley primary schools to promote the sport.

Amanda Unger, head coach of Kangas, said the limited number of young players coming into the game is not limited to just her club

"It's quite obvious there is a shortage of junior players coming through into our Gawler and District league," she said.

While traditional 'come and try' days are producing some sign-ups, Unger said "they were still lacking" and needed to get creative about the problem.

With this struggle, the head coach decided to put her best foot forward and find a new avenue of recruiting, going straight to the source.

Unger sent emails out to local Barossa schools proposing a free clinic, and quickly got back six positive RSPVs, including Freeling Primary School, the fourth stop on their local tour.

The idea has already begun to bear fruit, adding three youngsters to their tee-ball program, with plenty of further interest.

Discussing the appeal of softball, Unger highlighted the inclusive nature of the game, and emphasised the importance of "teamwork and having fun".

"It's a really fun sport, and with some quite diverse skills," she said.

"With all the running, catching, throwing and hitting, you're building a wider skill base than a lot of other sports.

"And they get to spend a lot of time with their team-mates – it's a team sport, it's about

community, being together and bringing each other up.

"Softball is also a game that's perfect for players of every size, shape and skillbase. They don't have to be ready-made sports athletes – they can have not played sport at all – but there's always a spot for them" The season does not resume until October, but pre-season is set to begin in August.
