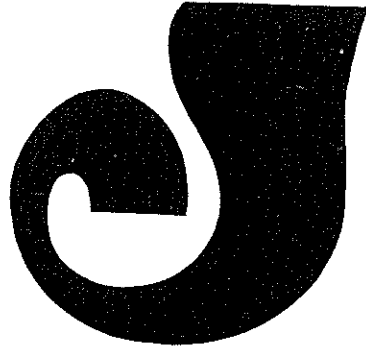

INAUGURAL NATIONAL TOURNAMENT

The change in format of the Australian Baseball Federation to promote greater community involvement in Under 13 baseball by introducing Pee Wee Baseball has arrived and the *Inaugural National Tournament* has been entrusted to the South Australian Baseball League.

I trust the inaugural series will be one of success and will provide an opportunity for those people who still have some regret about the change of direction to be convinced of the merit for the new format. From reports from all States and Territories it does appear that the introduction of the new format, whilst having its initial minor problems, has been successfully achieved and the number of youngsters (boys and girls) playing baseball has "exploded" to the extent that our expectations are becoming realistic.

The eight Pee Wee Commissioners have been busy establishing leagues in accordance with the A.B.F. Rules and Procedures in the metropolitan and country areas. The fact that seven of eight States and Territories are participating in the 1984 inaugural series is a credit to the Commissioners and others who have worked so hard during the past eighteen months to ensure that Pee Wee Baseball will revolutionise junior baseball in Australia.

To those who may not quite understand the change in format perhaps the following paragraph will explain it all.

Pee Wee Baseball provides baseball for boys and girls from 10 through to 12 years of age with the establishment organised by the formation of community leagues where baseball is played at a location and at a time that suits the local community. The Leagues usually consist of at least four teams and up to 120 players with all teams of equal talent and standard, thus ensuring good fun and even competition.

The philosophy of Pee Wee Baseball is for one local team to compete against another local team with the spectators being familiar with all players and not just the members of "their" team. This idea creates the happy situation where the local community can witness its youngsters in competition with each other in a healthy atmosphere which is both competitive and friendly. Pee Wee Baseball will involve the entire family as players, managers, coaches, umpires, administrators or league officials. What a better way to ensure a healthy family environment for todays youngsters and tomorrows citizens.

Pee Wee Baseball is a youth orientated programme dedicated to good citizenship, good sportsmanship and above all else, to young people having FUN.

To all participating or involved in the 1984 Pee Wee National Tournament, may you have an enjoyable and rewarding experience and witness yet another innovation by the Australian Baseball Federation to enable progress to be made and provide for the future requirements necessary to see Australia participate successfully on the international scene, particularly the Olympic Games.

"DAVE ROBERTS"

Teams competing in the Australian Pee Wee Baseball Championships vie for the coveted "Dave Roberts" Trophy, a trophy which has been eagerly sought by all States and Territories in the past under the format of the "Under 13" series.

It is perhaps most fitting that the inaugural Pee Wee Series is being played in Adelaide because Dave Roberts has certainly left his mark in South Australia with respect to junior baseball and the fact that his name will continue to be mentioned at all future national series is a living credit to the work he has done in the past for the betterment of Junior Baseball.

As a player, Dave progressed from the junior ranks himself to become a baseballer of no mean talent. Being a "Redsox" player he will always be remembered as a gentleman on and off the diamond, always willing to help others and one who displayed the "perfect baseballer" in all respects. He has represented the State of South Australia in the Claxton Shield competition and Australia at international level.

However, it was the promotion of junior baseball in South Australia that provided Dave with his biggest challenge. When the South Australian Public School Sports Association elected to discontinue the promotion of Junior Baseball, Dave was instrumental in establishing the South Australian Junior Baseball League with the objective of promoting the sport on a State basis. He was the inaugural Chairman of the SAJBL, as it became known, and for many years steered the sport from success to success. The SAJBL has since become an integral part of the South Australian Baseball League where Junior Baseball has continued to be administered successfully.

Besides overseeing Junior Baseball at the State level, Dave was involved with administration of the sport at National level and to this day we owe a great lot to him for his foresight of the needs of the younger generation and the development of Junior Baseball in this country.

During official proceedings associated with the presentation of the 1984 National Championships, Dave Roberts will once again be able to remember the 'good old days' and the 'work and effort' that he put into promoting Junior Baseball with *PRIDE and SATISFACTION*.

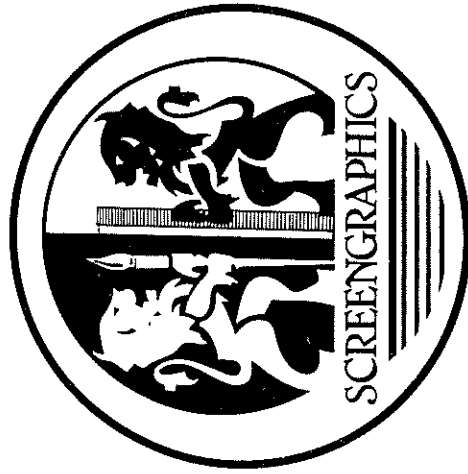

Games shall be of **six (6) innings** duration with the ten-run rule applying at the end of the fourth or subsequent innings.

Twenty (20) minutes before the scheduled starting time of a game, the visiting team shall be entitled to a seven (7) minutes **warm up** on the playing diamond. The Home team shall be entitled to its seven (7) minutes warm up on the playing diamond starting twelve (12) minutes before the scheduled commencement time of the game.

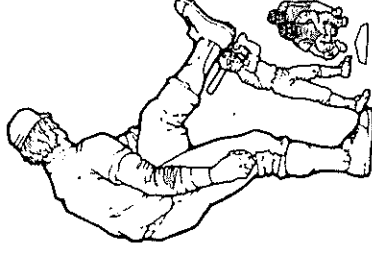
HENLEY & GRANGE BASEBALL CLUB INC.

This Club was formed in 1945 to provide a facility for the youth of the district to compete in the game of Baseball. The Club has as its object:-
"to promote and encourage the game of Baseball and to facilitate, extend and foster Baseball generally and to encourage the principle of fellowship among its members".

During the 1950's and 1960's the Club was a strong Minor League club winning many Minor A premierships. Following the change in format terminating the Minor League, competition was presented with the Mt. Barker perpetual shield.

With the changeover to summer baseball the Club struggled and within a few years developed policies to ensure the foundations of a strong and successful club. In 1980-81 the Club (known as the RAMS) was admitted to the top district competition. This provided the incentive for the Junior players to know that eventually they could play with the 'RAMS' in the top competition rather than transferring to other district clubs.

With the further development of the clubs exciting juniors and those T-Ballers and Pee Wee Leaguers in the district (there are two Tee Ball Clubs and one Pee Wee League) the future is exciting for the Henley & Grange Baseball Club Inc.

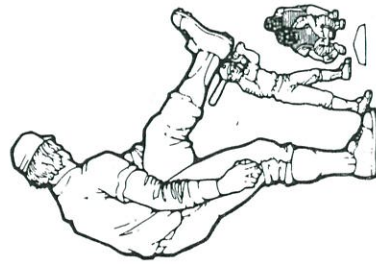

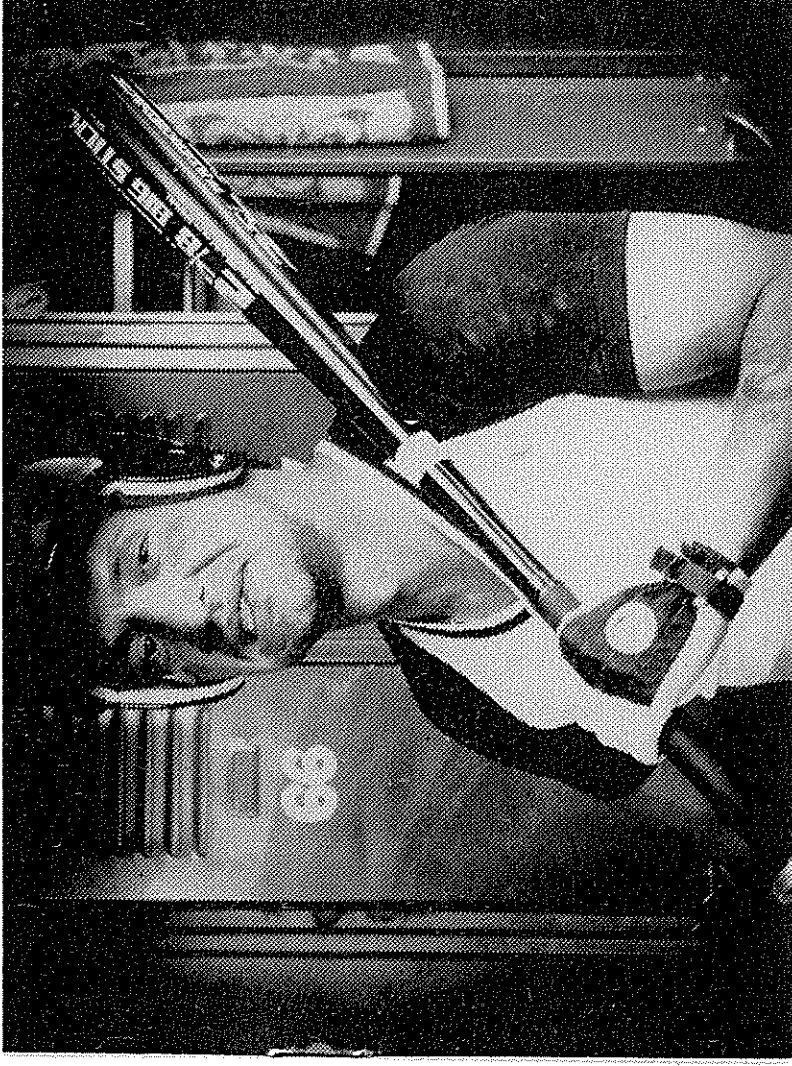

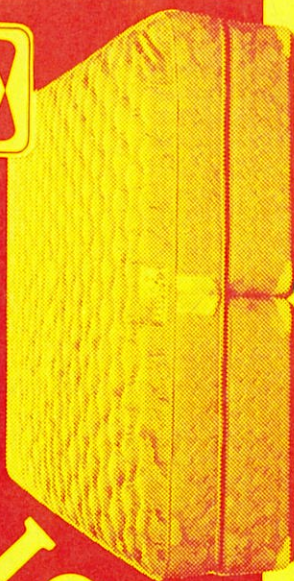
