

As a Coach/Assistant Coach appointed to a Hockey SA or affiliated club/association team participating in all competitions, you must meet the following requirements regarding your behaviour.

- 1. Be in control. Show respect and professionalism to all involved with the sport. This includes all players, opponents, officials, administrators, parents and spectators. Encourage players to do the same.
- 2. Place the safety and welfare of the players in your care above all else.
- 3. Operate within the rules and spirit of hockey and teach your players to do the same.
- 4. Avoid situations that may be perceived as a conflict of interest or may bring the sport into disrepute.
- 5. Ensure that the time players spend with you is a positive experience. All people are deserving of equal attention and opportunities.
- 6. Don't make detrimental statements in respect of the performance of any match officials or umpires.
- 7. Refrain from making derogatory comments on social media regarding our sport.
- 8. Help each person (player, official etc) reach their potential respect the talent, developmental stage and goals of each person and compliment and encourage with positive and supportive feedback.
- 9. Promote a climate of mutual support amongst the players. Encourage players to respect one another and their worth within the team.
- 10. Determine, in consultation with the player, what information is confidential and respect that confidentiality.
- 11. Adhere to the Anti-Doping Policy advocated by Hockey Australia.
- 12. Show concern and caution towards sick and injured players. Follow the advice of a physician when determining whether an injured player is ready to recommence training or competition.
- 13. Refrain from using obscene, offensive or insulting language and/or making obscene gestures which may insult players, officials or spectators.
- 14. Respect the rights, dignity and worth of all involved in hockey regardless of their age, gender, sexual orientation, ability, race, culture or religion.
- 15. Adhere to all legislation requirements and Hockey SA Childsafe Procedure Policy with regard to child safety issues, including a valid National Police Check (when working with athletes under the age of 18 years).
