Annual accounts and YQ fees have been emailed or posted out to all members. If you haven't received your account by the middle of June can you please let the club office know so that we can check your address details.

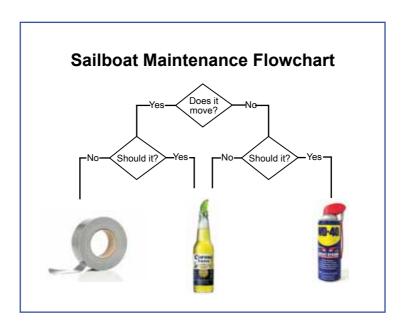

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2016 Hart Cup Article and images by Richard Cassidy

Following *Loco*'s highly enjoyable debut (but decidedly average result) in the 2015 Hart Cup the owners were keen to see if we could improve upon last year's performance and enjoy some more Mooloolaba hospitality.

Despite earlier long range forecasts suggesting strong winds on the back of a possible tropical cyclone forming, a fleet of 15 yachts from both Brisbane and Mooloolaba started the 2016 Hart Cup Good Friday in light airs. Following a clear start our 'first time' skipper Brendan made the call to hoist the Code 0 and head for Lockyer a decision that soon meant Loco was leading the fleet out around Green Island.

With the forecast for the breeze filling from the East *Loco* set a course towards M8 that saw us sail further right than the majority of the fleet who worked their way up the eastern shores of Green, St Helena and Mud Islands a decision that allowed us to stretch a sizeable lead on the fleet. With 5 to 8 knots from the south-east it was a two sail up to M9, through EK 1 and EK2 and past M3 and M1. From M1 a short asymmetrical kite ride was enjoyed down to NW12 where we dropped the kite and started a very slow two sail drift for over an hour as the breeze slowly filled in to around 8 knots from the North East allowing us to once again hoist the Code 0 and head down the northwest channel towards Caloundra.

With the breeze still in the North East it was a short beat from Caloundra to the Fairway at which point we could just see the first of the Gladstone Fleet Black Jack in the distance off Cape Moreton. Fairway to Point Cartwright was a pleasant two sail reach and as we rounded Point Cartwright the sun was starting to drop. We crossed the finish line just after 17:31 hrs achieving our aim of arriving in daylight. A quick motor across the bar into the river and we were soon tied up outside of 'the Yacht Club' enjoying the warm hospitality of Jock and his staff.

We were followed across the line by *Likeatiger* at 18:48 and *Mayhem* at 19:33. Unfortunately almost half of the fleet retired after having been becalmed in the bay for long periods so there were very few yachties at the Yacht Club until much later in the evening when we were joined by Mark Coghlan and his crew from *Ocean Warrior*.

The May day weekend saw a bevy of beautiful classic yachts assemble at WMYC for the Annual Timber and Traditional Boat Regatta. The racing focus of the regatta was the Vic Lucas Cup. This is awarded to the winner of Division 2.

In 1939 Vic Lucas won The "Foster Cup" at the annual (1923 to 1955) national restricted 21ft competition. As the trophy is historically tided to a 21ft class WMYC has allocated the event to the Division 2 fleet.

We had 18 entries making this event second only to QCYC's "Gaffers" in size for classic yacht regattas in Qld. The owners graciously supported the club by mooring at our marina so as to be available for walk past inspection on the Sunday morning. The catered breakfast and yacht gazing proved popular despite very ordinary and damp weather.

Locally built, (50 yrs old this year), and recently repainted and titivated classic *Karunda* was start, finish and official boat for the regatta. She took home the best present yacht from WMYC

Division 1 was won by Mischief Josh Franklin.

The Vic Lucas Cup was won by Tom Thumb Paul Aroney

The best presented Yacht was won by Wraith of Odin Keith Glover.

Wraith is a spectacular 60 ft Alden ketch. She is well known and well performed in Australia and New Zealand and WMYC would like to make a particular vote of thanks to Keith for making the effort to moor at our Marina

(rather then her home berth at RQYS) for the weekend thus allowing club members to see and enjoy her.

This is an event where the majority of entrants are visitors to WMYC. The support demonstrated for the event from sailors all around the Bay was most pleasing.

Dragon Boating's competitive season has come to an end for 2016. Not only a regular season but the biggest in the history of the sport in Australia. This year saw a combination of 3 major regattas to finish the season.

Over Easter week it was the Australian National Championships. Followed the next week by the Asian Championships. Finished in the third week with the Club Crew World Championships, all held in Adelaide.

Manly was represented in the Nationals and the Club Crews. The Asian Champs is a country crew race format, so the Australian team competed. None of our paddlers contested the event this year.

During the Australian Nationals, Manly went in to defend our title as the Masters Champions from 2015 in Perth. It was a very close contest over the 2 days of Masters racing. As always the Brisbane River Dragons provided very tough opposition. In the end we fell short by the official calculation and had to hand over the trophy. We sent a very young team in terms of experience. They paddled really well for us, and did themselves proud. Such a close finish only shows that next time with our full crew we will win it back again.

All the effort culminated in the Club Crew World Champs. Manly contested 11 different divisions over the 6 days of racing. Our crews performed well, though struggled with the huge program of events. It was very physically and mentally draining. To put it in perspective, the longest Olympic events are about 3 weeks for football. Players compete in about 6 90 minute games to win a medal. Our athletes covered 10 full 9 hour days of competition. Some of them really did do that much work. A massive effort by all, and they came home with another World Championship title in the Senior B Mixed crew. First time ever for our men to win a title – the previous 2 have been all women crews.

We go into a quiet time for a while, with only 1 training session a week. In June that moves to 2, then it will increase in spring to 3 then 4. Next year has just the National Titles, followed in 2018 with Club Crew Worlds again, in Hungary. Paddling never stops!!

After the M9, the pecking order in the fleet was well established. It was here that we realised that our annual subscription to Aeolus the wind God's superannuation fund had run out. It was spinnaker up at the M9 and down 2 minutes later with the Screecher being unfurled. No, get the genoa up; get it down. Get the reaching kite up. When we looked again, the front end of the fleet were specks on the horizon. Memo to diary, renew that subscription.

Clearing the Caloundra fairway as darkness fell, we noticed a shift in the breeze to the left. Great. so now we are hard on the wind and there wasn't much of that either. Last vear we had blasted past Double Island Point at 6.45 pm on Friday night. This year we arrived at DI Point at 0600 on Saturday morning. make it worse, the breeze failed us completely so we sat there in a sloppy sea flopping about for 3 hours. All sharp objects on Hasta had to be hidden at this time just in case. It was that miserable

Hasta had worked wide on Saturday morning to have sufficient angle to launch spinnaker. The flat run up the Fraser coast became increasingly

pleasant; still not fast but an enjoyable day out. Past Indian Head at 3 pm and our masthead spinnaker could finally be launched for the run up past Breaksea and on to Lady Elliott. Sailing this stretch of water with flat seas, the boat gliding at above wind speed and the blackest of black night skies with the stars exploding out of the blackness with their brilliance, was just spectacular. When the orange golden moon rose out of the sea in our wake, it completed the magic of the moment. The crew started to get better looking in this romantic setting so we all knew it was time to hurry up to the finish.

At dawn on Sunday the breeze at long last had swung to the SE and built to 9 -10 knots. We were now laying the S2 at a good pace. With 20 miles to the S2 the wind swung to the south and built to 14 knots. We were now aiming at Cape Capricorn under masthead kite so down it came and up with the Screecher to resume our proper course. With the screecher cranked on, Hasta exploded into life as the boat speed rapidly increased to 18 knots. All good things must come to an end and sadly for us (but smiles from our sailmaker), it was the top of our screecher exploding into tatters. Down came the remnants and up went the genoa to drive above course until we had an angle to launch our flat kite for the reach to the entry of Gladstone Harbour.

The 12 mile run to the finish under masthead spinnaker was great fun. Tiredness was forgotten, gybing our 105 square metre spinnaker was sharp and the end was in sight. What a great race it is to Gladstone; it has everything. The carton of beer at the finish even improved our hydration. The fun factor is important and sailing with good mates helps so thanks to fellow crew members Lyle Stanaway, Rob Sherwood and Tim Keen. The bottle of rum we won for naviguessing the ETA nearest the actual finish time went to a most worthy cause.

The previous two years of the Brisbane to Gladstone had been plagued with light winds which had seen the majority of the fleet retire. Boats had of course persevered and finished but it was a tall order especially those in the 2nd half of the fleet. So '*Redjam*' entered the 2016 race with the express purpose of finishing the race! The first half of the race was another slow affair taking till late afternoon to reach Tangalooma and leaving the Fairway buoy off Coloundra about 8pm. The run north was slow with us passing Double Is Pt at dawn and working our way to Indian Head on Fraser Is at Dusk. A few slow hours ensured amongst the strong currents in this vicinity before some good breeze arrived amongst some squally clouds near Breaksea spit.

We arrived at the Gladstone Fairway buoy at midnight at the top of the tide and had reasonable wind to push the outgoing tide till we finished about 3.30am. 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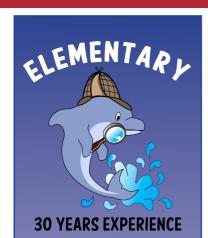
